

It will be here before we know it! In 2025 the BWA will celebrate our **100th Anniversary!** As we begin thinking about plans to celebrate, please enjoy this short history compiled by June Akita:

The Tacoma Buddhist Temple's first women's association (Fujinkai) was organized in 1925 as a fellowship and service organization to direct its activities toward assisting in various Temple functions and community affairs. The organization consisted mainly of Issei (first generation) ladies and was usually under

the guidance and leadership of the okusama (minister's wife). (The Temple Toban system was used from 1925-1934 and 1938-1955.) Martha Yoshioka was the first Nisei (second generation) elected as President to manage the organization in 1974. In 1996, the name was changed nationally to the Buddhist Women's Association (BWA) concurrently as our Fujinkai celebrated their 70th anniversary. Under the leadership of Patti Wong, first Yonsei (fourth generation) elected President, BWA continues to practice and carry on the legacy left by the Issei ladies with the same dedication and vision that was created nearly 100 years ago. **Member update**

BWA member Riu Pittman is getting better every day. She is now walking without a walker and her stamina in steadily improving. She misses Temple and everyone, saying it is her favorite place and that it gives her so much joy. She wants to thank everyone for the cards and wishes and for thinking about her throughout her illness and recovery. She hopes to be back to Temple in September.

Buddhist Education Committee News



July was Tacoma Pride month and the Book Group discussed *This Monk Wears Heels: Be Who You Are.* The author, Rev. Kodo Nishimura, is a well-known makeup artist and Jodo Shu priest. The book's main message is that people should be proud of who they are even in the face of the denigration and insults of others. Sadly Rev. Nishimura, who is gender nonbinary, has firsthand experience with both. Reading this book led me to think about Amida Buddha, but first I will explain the term "nonbinary" for those who aren't familiar with it.

Nowadays a lot of people, especially young people, draw a distinction between a person's sex and their gender. "Sex" refers to the parts and shape of one's body, but "gender" refers to one's identity in terms of society and expression of self. Traditionalists and conversative folks usually insist that your sex and your gender must be the same, but many people recognize that our bodies are only part of the story of who we are. In terms of gender, Rev. Nishimura does not identify as either male (he/him) or female (she/her), so we say that they are "nonbinary". I don't know what pronouns Rev. Nishimura prefers, but I will use "they/them" as you usually can't go wrong that way. (For folks who think "they/them" should only be used for the plural, "they" has been used in the singular in English since at least the 14th century; and remember, "you" also began as plural, but we have come to use it for both plural and singular.)

So, what about Shin Buddhism? Shinran taught that the primary characteristics of Amida Buddha are infinite light, immeasurable life, and the Name. Like a number of folks, I myself tend not to think of Amida Buddha as a personified being, but as the wisdom and compassion of True Reality that calls to and embraces us all universally. So, it does not make sense to me to ascribe a gender to them, just like it doesn't make sense to Rev. Nishimura to ascribe a gender to themself.
