# **Buddhist Education Committee News**



First off, I'd like to start by saying thank you to everyone who helped with this year's Fall Bazaar. We truly appreciate you all for taking the time to support our annual event! We enjoyed seeing you all and being able to spend some time together. As Bazaar passes this means that Bodhi day is just around the corner so make sure to mark your calendars for Sunday, December 4th. To wrap up the year on December 31st, we will be holding Joya-e at 4:00 PM

followed by toshikoshi soba. Lastly, it wouldn't be complete without New Year's Day service at 10:00 AM followed by rice cake soup.

I always try to take note whenever I notice Buddhism becoming more apparent in my daily life. Most of the time it's pretty impromptu. For example, recently at work my company had our monthly meeting and the theme this month was the changing of seasons. We were told to bring our favorite leaf (with a prize for the top three leaves). The meeting invite was quite vague on what they meant by "our favorite leaf" so I interpreted this as our favorite leaf we'd find on our way to work. As I was on my way to work I thought I had found the perfect "favorite leaf". It quite literally showed the changing of the season since half of the leaf was brown while the other half of the leaf was still mostly green. My plan was to talk about how this individual leaf is showing the transition into the new season and how perfectly flat it was to see the slow gradient from green to brown.

Once I got to work I gently took my leaf out and placed it on my side table so it would not get lost or damaged before the meeting. Then finally it was noon, time for our monthly meeting and time to show off the perfect leaf. As I turned to my side table, the ends of the leaf were no longer flat and perfect, they had begun to curl into itself, and the green half was now only the size of a penny. It shocked me that in only four hours my "perfect" leaf was somehow ruined, but instantly I knew what I wanted to talk about – impermanence. When my turn came, I talked about how this was the perfect leaf, not because of how it looked, but because it taught me that nothing lasts forever and we must cherish each moment. This leaf allowed me to appreciate that moment I experienced when I picked it up. Immediately after sharing, I felt good and actually very profound. However, just like my leaf, that moment was now gone because the next person who shared had a live monstera leaf and the following person had a sensitivity plant which may have seemed more impressive. Ultimately, I did not win a prize, but it was really interesting to reflect on a concept I learned from Buddhism and how it applies to things beyond what I see and hear at temple.
